Holiday Cheer on Main Street in Addison















Storefront owners welcomed students into their businesses to paint storefront windows with Christmas decorations. Five local businesses participated with gusto as they opened their doors to our students and staff. Jamie Hoad, owner of Old, New & Everything in Between, said, "It's a great opportunity for students to get out in the community and do things like this." Seeing the teacher and class interacting with our local business owners was heartwarming and joyous. The Addison School District-Community connection is exceptionally rare and special. This activity was a grand success.

The event was initiated during a Board of Education meeting. President Marty Wheeler shared a request that came from local community member Scott Bruce for a class to paint windows in downtown Addison. 

In his own words, he says the class is "an idea that provides students practical, real-life experiences and knowledge."

The course was a hit success with Mr. Shelton teaching it for three separate periods. Recently, students finished their mock trial in which fellow colleague, Mr. VanWoert, died a mysterious death and the students had to puzzle it out. Mr. Shelton really wants this course to be a "Hit home course." He is planning trips and guest speakers that will all bring a variety of skills and experiences to his students.


A major learning goal that Shelton has for the course is to teach students to have a positive relationship with law en-

forcement: "We're all going to have those encounters... sadly in our society we see videos of when they go wrong. But there are several interactions a day where they go fine, and it all goes back to your attitude."

Exposing students to their rights is a major goal for this course. A couple of essential questions that Mr. Shelton proposed for the course are: "What are your rights and what are the limitations of your rights?" This is such an amazing opportunity for students to have now more than ever; it is important to know one's rights and limitations.

Mr. Shelton would like the community of Addison to know: "My goal is always to make this course better. So I'd always love to hear from members of the community if they can think of any experiences they've had... I am always open to hear that. And I just want to thank people for being supportive." Thank you, Mr. Shelton, for providing this opportunity to students.

Staff Spotlight: Coach Max Young



Upcoming Winter Weather Season

Although we hope for no inclement weather, we live in New York and that is not going to happen. Bus safety is a critical component to overall school safety as our busses and bus drivers are on the road daily transporting students to and from school, traveling to out of district placements, as well as to extra-curricular/athletic events in the evening. As you know, delaying or closing school is a challenging decision to make. We use all information available (at the time) to make "the call". We frequently communicate with the county and town and village highway departments to ensure we are making an appropriate decision. With all of this said, below is a brief summary of the various places to access delay/cancelation information, in logical order to do so:

School Closings/Delays/Cancelations:

- 1. Go to the school district web site: Addisoncsd.org we will announce it there <u>first</u> with our on-screen alert (pop up message) on the home page. This is probably the easiest and quickest way to find out any
- 2. Go to the Addison District Facebook page.
- 3. Watch the local TV news and/or listen to the local radio stations—not always the fastest way to find out this information.
- 4. Wait for a call from our automated dialer system.

Note that in most cases, the call will be made before 6AM on the morning of the weather event. If the weather is **severe enough**, we will try to call off school the *night before*. We will follow the same protocol as above.

Canceling After School and/or Evening Events:

On the occasion where we have to cancel an after school or evening activity, late bus, and/or athletic event, we will work to make a decision (as soon as possible) and follow the steps above for cancelations.

<u>Please note #1</u> - There is never the "right" time of day to make any of these decisions. Much of the decision will be dictated by weather patterns, forecasting possible future weather events, and the advice from those places that we may be travelling to: This is ALL in the name of safety for everyone!

Please note #2 – None of us went to school to be meteorologists, but we pledge to do the best we can with the information that is made available to us at the time, always erring on the side of caution. Remember, there is a delicate balancing act between needing to provide an education (and other related school services and activities) for our students and the monitoring of weather conditions that are inevitable this time of year!

<u>Please note #3</u> - The *variations in the weather*, along with changing road conditions, can be very different from school district to school district and even within our own district.

Please Note #4 - The use of a remote day or two (in late winter/early spring) is always a possibility if we have a challenging winter weather season!

In the event that we have to close school early after everyone is already here on campus, the District will follow our emergency go home early procedures established by your school building or department.

Holiday Hours:
