Northrup Schoolhouse and Sanctuary Visit

On a chilly Thursday, October 17, 2024, 7th grade students from Addison Middle School went to the Northrup Schoolhouse and Northrup Wildlife Sanctuary located on the Learn Road between Cameron Mills and Rathbone, NY. Students were greeted by the wonderful volunteers of the Middletown Historical Society and then split into two main groups; one explored the sanctuary and the other participated in programs centered around the old schoolhouse. Students learned about the typical school day at Northrup Hill District No.10 Schoolhouse, expecta-

tions of student behavior, and the curriculum taught in the 1800s and early 1900s. When students were not in the schoolhouse, students were outside playing games such as ring toss, horseshoes, sack races, and hoop rolling. The Sanctuary offered students the experience of winding through the 24-acre wildlife preservation. Beginning the hike, students were offered the breathtaking view of the valley below from the vista point near the head of the trail. Students then began the slow descent to the wetland-marsh at the north end of the preserve, followed by the ascent back to the beginning of the trailhead. Evidence of deer, turkey, and beaver were evident along the way, along with the chirps of feathered friends warning any wildlife that packs of 7th graders were on their way if they couldn’t be heard already.

Valley Early Childhood School News



Students at the Valley covered letters C, D and E this month and numbers 1-5. Students also learned about Halloween safety at KKI. They celebrated staff birthdays and the Knights of the week. Students made D shaped donut crafts and talked about many items that begin with the letter D. They also learned about and how to ask for what they need and want. For example, they practiced using a strong and respectful voice so that it is clear what they are asking for. The 3-year-olds have been learning about everything pumpkin-related, the different parts of the pumpkin, how a pumpkin grows and even carving a pumpkin. Miss Korver, Miss Lacey, Mrs. Grist, Miss Tammy and Mrs. Wright dressed as pumpkins and performed the 5 little pumpkins song for the kids and the kids got to sing along.

Students have made various crafts to represent the things they are learning at Valley. Mrs. Gardner and Ms. Preston talked about germs and how they can cause people to get sick, emphasizing how it's important to keep hands out of our mouth, nose and to use a tissue. They learned about how when students put their hands in those places and then touch things or put toys in their mouth, that also spreads germs. Mrs. Gardner demonstrated this by using a spray bottle with water in it to show how far a sneeze can go. She also demonstrated this with green silly string. They talked about when people sneeze, they should try their best to do it into their "chicken wing" (elbow) or a tissue. Ms. Preston demonstrated this by pretending to sneeze into her hands where she had hidden green slim to show the germs. She then touched various toys and walked around to show the children how those germs were spreading to everything she touched. They talked about how important it is to wash hands to help keep everyone healthy and safe. The students also enjoyed some gym and outside time.

Science Classes Study Tuscarora Creek

Students in Mr. DeRycke’s Living Environment and A.P. Environmental Science classes at Addison High School have been conducting an ecological survey of Tuscarora Creek. They have been using kick seining and dip netting methods to collect biological samples from the creek. In the lab the students have been using microscopes, magnifying glasses and dichotomous keys to identify the various species present in their collected samples. Once identified, the students then made counts of how many of each different species was found.

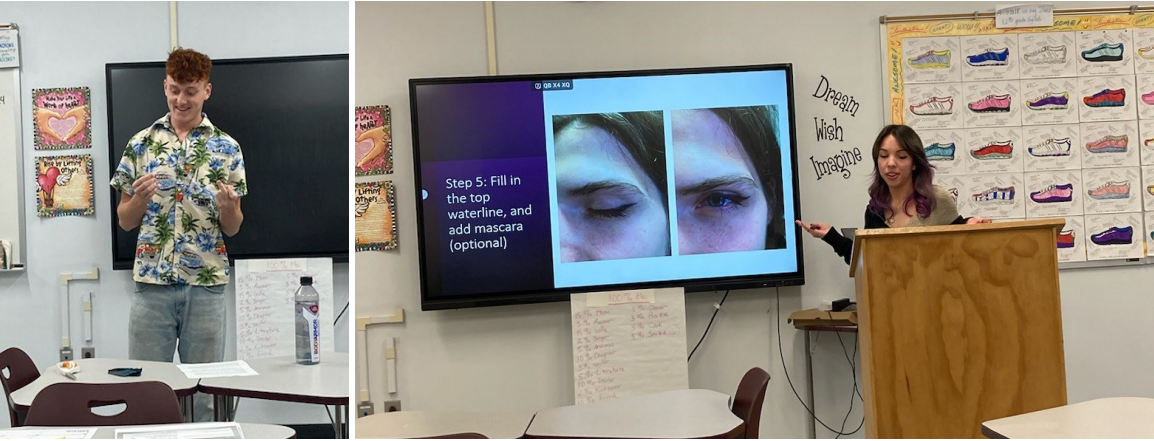
The students will then use this species census data to determine the biodiversity of Tuscarora Creek. This biodiversity data will help measure the environmental health of the creek. Collected organisms have then been added to the class’ 40 gallon freshwater aquarium for extended observation of their behavior in a model stream ecosystem.

This field/lab activity is providing the students with the opportunity to develop real life skills as wildlife biologists and environmental scientists.



Demonstration Speeches in ACE Public Speaking

The students in Mrs. Ferratella’s ACE Public Speaking class wrote demonstration speeches on how to do something. They were encouraged to pick a topic of their choice. They were instructed to provide a tangible model of what they were demonstrating. The students were given 3-5 minutes to speak. The students from Mr. Lyons’ study hall joined the class to give them a more authentic audience and watch the demonstrations. Student, Andrew Jones claims, “I think I presented very well. I felt a little more pressure since students from Mr. Lyons’ class came up to watch. But when I was done, I became more confident because now I know I can do it.” Andrew presented on how to properly make pre workout and the benefits of it. Some of the other topics that were presented were how to tie your shoes, how to draw a flower, how to make a golf ball curve, how to throw a foot-



ball, how to get gas at the gas station, and many others. All of the students that presented made the 3-minute mark, which was the minimum. Students benefited from this activity by using critical thinking and gaining confidence in speaking in front of a group of people. The audience also benefited by improving their active listening skills.

A New Look for the Technology Wing

The middle/high school has a new area for technology classes that was completed this fall. The latest phase of the Capstone Project included a reconfiguration and upgrade of the high school art room. The upgrades in the new space include ceiling-mounted retractable power outlets above the worktables, a kiln room, a larger ceramics area, a large shelving unit for storage and displaying artwork, LED lighting along with plenty of windows that provide an abundance of natural lighting, multiple sinks, and new cabinetry. “The space is a wonderful place for students to work, be creative, collaborate, and share ideas” says Ms. Dubois who teaches Creative Crafts, Studio in Art, Drawing and Painting, Ceramics, and Sculpture. Mrs. Kujawski, who teaches Materials Processing and 6th and 8th grade technology said, “With the new space there’s lots of room for the students to work, allowing them to build larger projects. Another plus is that the finishing room has its own ventilation so there’s no sawdust in the air.” Mr. Roy, who teaches 6th, 7th and 8th grade technology and Manufacturing at the high school says, “These tables are awesome.”

What's new this season? Swain is making several changes to the way they operate this season. Please read the information below and reach out to one of us if you have any questions. These are changes that we as advisors have no control over. Hopefully they will make the process of registering your child for Ski Club easier!

- ❖ The school club website used to order tickets and submit forms is now password protected, parents will need to enter a password to access the page. ➤ Website link: www.swain.com/clubs
- Website Password: **thinknow!**
- ❖ Students will **NOT** receive coupons for ticket packs; They will receive a plastic card with a photo and a barcode. The barcode will be scanned at the ticketing window to redeem an anytime or twilight lift ticket.
- ❖ Medical and Rental forms will be completed electronically. Swain's software will force each parent to complete these as soon as they purchase a ticket pack or a rental package.
- ❖ Swain will need a photo from every student/member in the club, our software will allow the parents to upload a photo.
