Home Away From Home: Exchange Students of Addison

The Addison School District has a long-standing history of accepting exchange students in the student body. These students come for either a half or a full year at a time and live with a host family. This year, there are 8 host families and 9 students, from Italy, Germany, Switzerland, Turkey, and Brazil, using two different organizations: Academic Year in America (AYA) and Education First (EF).

Host families are volunteers and do not receive any payment for the year. The process requires a background check and a reference check. Another component



includes a home visit, along with a lengthy application. A local coordinator then sits with the family to make sure that all family members are in agreement with the rules and regulations before finalizing the application and allowing the family to determine final placement. Families can choose students based on gender and activities/interests or narrow the results to select from specific countries or areas of the world. Some organizations have subgroups of students who have applied for and earned scholarships to help fund their time in the United States. Mrs. Clark, host mother of Niklas with AYA, says that she chose him because "he had similar interests with both of my children in soccer and guitar, but what really made him stand out was when I saw that he was a twin. As a twin myself, I knew it was a match."

When students are chosen by the family, contact information is given to the host family and exchange student to allow them begin communicating with each other. Families are encouraged to get to know one another and exchange rules/expectations before arrival. When summer is almost over, the students prepare for their trip, packing their luggage and saying goodbye to friends to family. Some students will attend a brief orientation upon their arrival in the US, while others will fly directly to meet their new host family.

Once they arrive in the US, the students become part of the family, doing chores, and making friends. They are encouraged to join sports or clubs to meet their interests (some trying new sports or activities for the first time) and taking part in American traditions (such as Homecoming). Francesco, an EF student from Italy, says, "I really enjoyed meeting the soccer team for the first time and making friends. I have never played soccer before, and the team was very welcoming and helped me learn."

Some organizations offer activities to get together with other area exchange students, even offering trips throughout the year. AYA students are encouraged to give back to their new communities by volunteering, even receiving awards for reaching a certain number of hours. Recently, 10 local students volunteered at the finish line of the Wineglass Marathon, handing out water bottles and congratulating the runners as they finished. Students look forward to participating in other activities throughout the year to enrich their experience. Some even give presentations to local groups about their home country and culture.

In June, the exchange students take local and Regents exams with their classmates to finalize their transcripts, concluding their year in America. This is the hardest part for many of the students and families, as they have to pack up all of their belongings and say goodbye to the place that has become their home. Exchange students return to their home countries with memories to last a lifetime and the ability to share their experiences that have positively impacted them as a person. American students are left with fond memories of their friends from other countries, and a wealth of knowledge about a place they may never visit

Terri Rogers, AYA Local Coordinator says, "Having international students as peers is an opportunity for our children to grow. They learn that even though on the surface, cultural attributes may seem different, what let's us make connections is the common humanity. They learn about the world. Geography takes on a whole different meaning when you know someone from that country. And finally, in our communities, this type of exposure to diversity, helps our children to lift their eyes beyond the usual landscape [and] this broadens our kids' horizons."

Welcome Mr. Roy: Bringing Revolutionary Ideas to the Classroom



Getting to Know: Pauljonas Beth


